1.	Welcome, Introductions and Apologies The Chair welcomed everyone to the	(ii ciry)	
2.	meeting. Minutes of previous meeting		
	The minutes of the previous meeting were agreed as an accurate record.		
3.	Ryan and Emily Child Safeguarding Practice Review		
	The Lead Reviewer, Mark Dalton, provided an overview of the Child Safeguarding Practice Review undertaken for Emily and Ryan.		
	Mark Dalton noted that the way that practitioners tried to engage Emily and Ryan was creditable.		
	The WSEB were advised that Mark Dalton had tried to meet with Emily and Ryan; however, they did not wish to engage with the review process. As both Emily and Ryan are care leavers, there is support available to both of them from the Leaving Care Service until they are 25 years of age.		
	Members of the WSEB acknowledged that this was a comprehensive report with reasonable recommendations and findings		



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	and agreed to endorse both the report and the Lessons Learned Briefing. Amrita Sharma advised that the report will be shared with the National Panel the w/c 25/09/23 and the report is due to be published on 01/12/23.		
4.	Safeguarding Guidance for Faith Communities Amrita Sharma informed the WSEB that the West Yorkshire and Birmingham regional consortium is proposing to oversee development of bespoke, up to date, on-line children's, and adult's safeguarding guidance, initially for the six main religious faiths in West Yorkshire and Birmingham: 1) Islam 2) Christianity 3) Judaism 4) Buddhism 5) Sikhism 6) Hinduism Warwickshire Safeguarding have been invited to join this initiative which the WSEB endorsed.		
5.	Options paper – future scrutineer role and SAB Chair Members of the WSEB previously discussed the proposals surrounding Working Together and the idea of the partnership having a rotating independent chair and a separate individual scrutineer. Nigel Minns advised that there is a paper due to be presented to council next week which sets out the council's proposals to reorganise the organisation. It is being proposed that the council will split the people directorate into two and revert to a directorate for Children and Young People and a directorate for Social Care and Health. If the proposals are accepted, Nigel Minns will become the Executive Director of Children's Services. The overall		



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	responsibility for Social Care and Health will sit with an Executive Director who is yet to be appointed. Therefore, it was agreed that the partnership will continue as it is until the responses from the DFE and WCC paper are released.

6.	WS Multi-Agency training annual report 2022-23 The WSEB were presented with the 2022-23 training annual report. Amrita Sharma advised the WSEB that to reinforce some of the key messages coming out of reviews and to place a spotlight on areas for improvement, the training programme has been aligned with the learning coming out of reviews. The training report provides an overview of the multi-agency training programme and the levels of engagement over the year. A total of 21 multi-agency training sessions have been delivered covering a range of topics: Advocacy for Children and Young People An Introduction to Trauma Building Relationships Engaging with Children who have Experienced Child Sexual Abuse Mind your Language Professional Curiosity Psychology of Victim Blaming, and Self-Blame of Women and Girls Subjected to Sexual Violence Safeguarding through a Trauma Informed Lens Social Prescribing and its use in Trauma Informed Practice The Role of the LADO		



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	Using the Mental Capacity Act in the Context of Safeguarding and Self-Neglect Vicarious and Organisational Trauma Victim Blaming and Language Working with Advocates (adults) Amrita Sharma advised the WSEB that she is due to reach out to those agencies who have a low level of attendance to see how we can make the training programme more engaging for them. The WSEB agreed that the partnership should continue to focus on online training to support maximum reach. In addition, it was agreed that the partnership should hold their annual safeguarding conference in Summer 2024. A working group is to be convened to organise the conference content. 8.	JTAI – Multi-Agency response to serious youth violence Jackie Chanell advised members that the new JTAI programme is looking at serious youth violence and the multi-agency approach to this. This is being carried out in conjunction with the CQC, HMICFRS and HMIP. It was noted that the Community Safety Partnership have developed the serious violence strategy and have oversight of this. Therefore, the WSEB questioned how confident the partnership is that this is picked up from a safeguarding perspective. To strengthen the link and align the work programmes, it was agreed that Jackie Channell would discuss this at the next Community Safety Partnership meeting. 	Rapid Review 1:		
	 Rapid Review 1 was held on 12/07/23. The key learning points that came out of this review were: An intense focus on working with the parents to improve but no evidence reflecting any impact or change to quality of life for child 1 The interpretation of language and terminology between agencies Missed opportunities to work together to escalate Supervision and oversight of professional decision making Impact of covid 		
	Members were advised that the impact of covid is something that is still considered at all rapid reviews undertaken.		
	The Rapid Review panel agreed that this case met the criteria for a Local Child Safeguarding Practice Review. The partnership has looked at the existing learning that has been drawn from other similar reviews and feel that the learning identified could be incorporated into another CSPR that is being undertaken. Therefore, this review will be undertaken under a long-term chronic neglect theme.		
	This recommendation has been endorsed by the National Panel and the Terms of Reference are with the Safeguarding Reviews Subgroup for consideration. If the ToR are endorsed by the SRS, IMR's will be sent out to partner agencies. The partnership will soon be reaching out to

11.	VARM The VARM panel met on 20/09/23 to sign off the VARM documents. These documents will now be presented to the Safeguarding Reviews Subgroup for feedback. Following endorsement by the Safeguarding Reviews Subgroup, they will then be presented to the Partnership Group for consideration. It is anticipated that the documents will be presented to the WSEB in December 2023 for final sign off and the VARM will then commence in January 2024. Annual Report Elaine Coleridge-Smith requested for Nigel Minns to complete his annual report return. Nigel Minns is to liaise with lan Redfern and Daniel Atkins. The Draft Annual Report is to be presented to the WSEB on 12/10/23. RAAC The WSEB were advised that there are three schools in Warwickshire that have been affected by the RAAC issue. The DFE have committed to pay all the associated costs. Portacabins provided by the DFE are likely to take three months, rather than the specified two weeks. Myton Academy have an online learning offer in place. However, Aylesford Academy's online offer is not yet in place. There is a concern that there a number of children missing out on education.
