The newly published WSAB Strategic Plan details our strategic priorities for 2025-2028 framed by our vision to "Work with partners and communities to safeguarding people's right to live free from abuse and neglect, ensuring their views and wishes inform their safeguarding outcomes".

Whilst we are committed to adhering to our statutory responsibilities as a Safeguarding Adults Board to adults with care and support needs, we have proved ourselves open to considering/promoting a whole range of issues that impact on the overall safety and well-being of the wider adult population across the county.

Our membership is diverse and includes statutory partners and a whole range of key professionals who work with vulnerable adults who are at risk of abuse or neglect. This brings a much-welcomed breadth and depth of information sharing to our meetings.

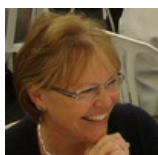
We are now in a strong position to move forward, developing our work around safeguarding our adult population.

Learning from Safeguarding Adult Reviews

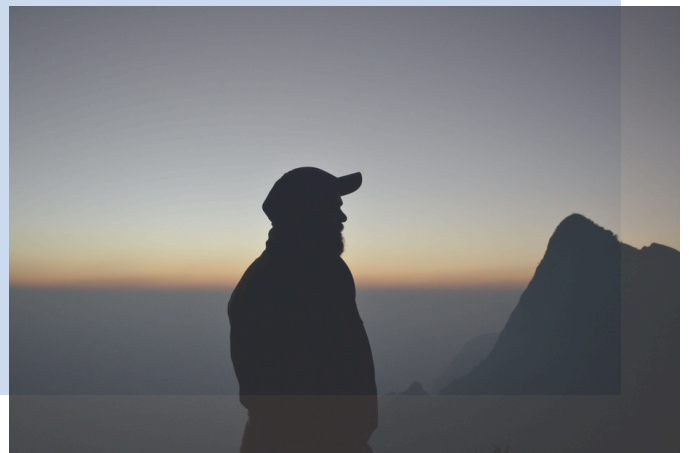
Nick and Leo - Lessons Learned Briefing

Nick and Leo were two men in their 50s who lived in the same area, at the same time, but did not know each other. Both had substance misuse issues, poor mental health and may have been victims of exploitation.

Learning has been identified for professionals working with adults around:

- Importance of multi-agency meetings
- Mental capacity assessments
- Being aware of indicators and signs of exploitation
- Person-centred practice

Advance Care Planning

Advance care planning is a person-centred approach to document how an adult would like to be cared for as an illness progresses. It documents the discussion and decisions made. It can be reviewed regularly and shared with care providers to ensure that the individual's preferences, such as who can advocate on their behalf, can be considered in their ongoing and future care if they lose capacity to make these decisions.

Supporting Gender Identity Needs

This briefing is a multi-agency guide for supported practice when working with young people, adults and families.

Warwickshire Safeguarding Adults Board aims to empower its communities by helping people to understand what abuse

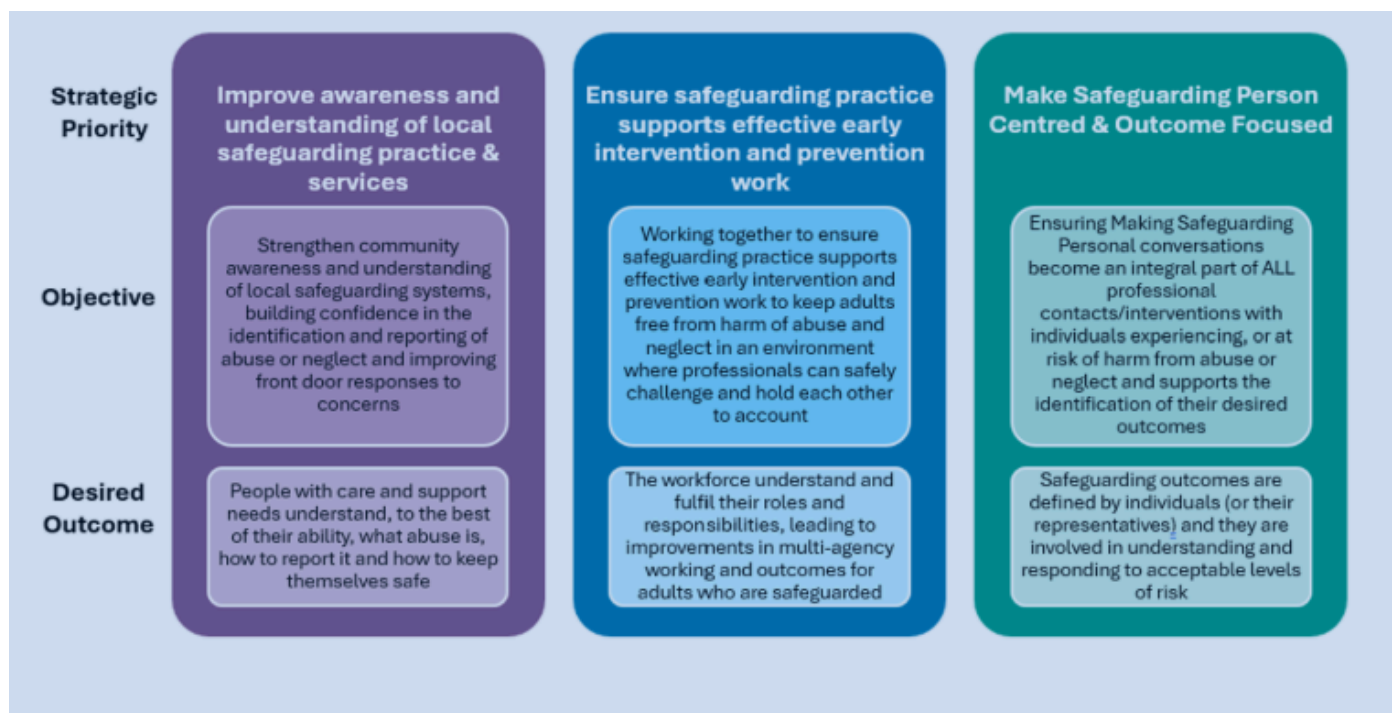
and neglect is, how to report concerns and by supporting its workforce through clear and concise policy and procedures to respond to these concerns.

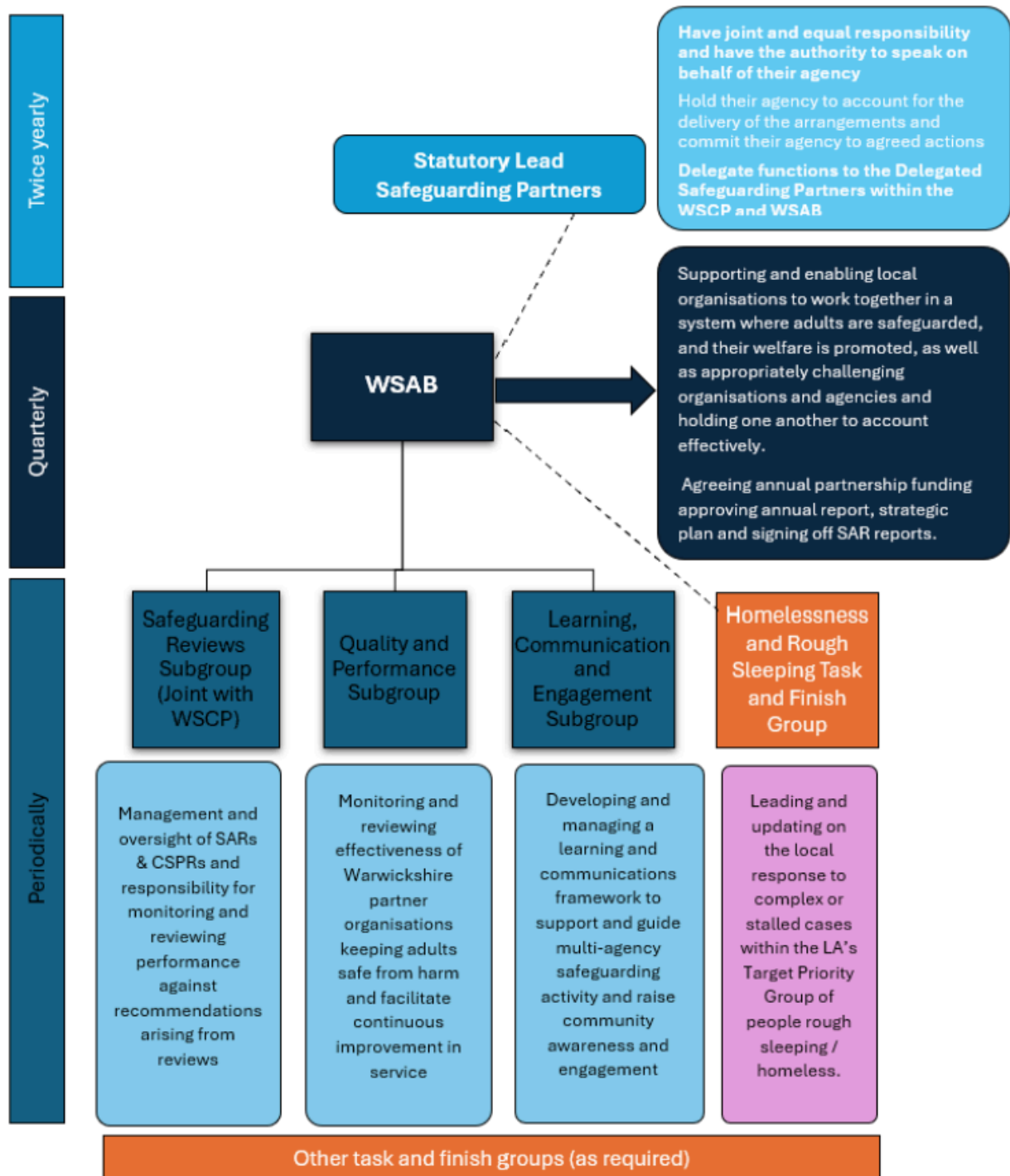

What is a VARM?

VARM stands for 'vulnerable adult risk management', in which agencies can facilitate a multi-agency meeting for adults, who are deemed to have capacity, and are experiencing a concerning and unmanageable level of risk.

Who can lead and facilitate a VARM?

Any agency can do this.

What are the benefits of a VARM meeting?

- Improving an adult's wellbeing
- Breaking down of silo working and sharing of responsibility
- Information sharing process
- Opportunity to engage with the adult in a respectful environment
- Identifying risks with the adult
- Record of multi-agency risk assessment
